Dear Parent/Carer,

I am writing to you with an exciting opportunity for your child. As a school we would like to be able to offer instrumental tuition from September. However, before we can look at buying in hours of tuition we need to work out what to offer and get an idea of how many pupils would be interested.

Instrumental tuition would operate throughout the school day, usually in group lessons with about 4 children at a time for 20 minutes. There will be a fee of £4.00 a lesson to cover the cost of the tutor, depending on which instrument the children are learning and the size of group it would be feasible to teach in this amount of time. There is of course support available for pupils who would struggle to pay which will be available on request for those in receipt of universal tax credits.

The children have had an assembly recently, to give them an understanding of what instrumental lessons could be available. Please could you talk to your child over the weekend and find out if they would like to learn to play an instrument and then fill in the form below. It would be useful if you could provide details about what they would like to learn and if they have any prior experience and return it to their class teacher on Monday or asap. It is necessary for us to book tuition this term, in readiness for September, or we are likely to lose out for another year as slots will already have been filled and timetables created. Your speedy reply will be most helpful and gratefully received.
